Ever wonder whether your ballot made it to
the Elections Office? BallotTrax can help!

BallotTrax is a secure software application
that locates ballot envelopes. The system
works with election officials and the Post
Office to send you messages when your
ballot is received as well as notifies you if
there is a discrepancy. By logging into the
BallotTrax site, voters can see their mail-in
ballot status and sign up for alerts.

The sign up process is simple. Just sign on,
enter contact info, select message method
(email, text and voice messages), and note
what time works best for messaging.



Options for Returning Your Voted Ballot

Mail Using the Official Envelope




- Place marked ballot into the official return envelope that you received in the mail.
- Sign and date the envelope. If you are unable to sign, you may use your “mark” and have a witness sign.
- For locations outside of the United States, additional postage may be required.
- Seal the envelope.
- Put the envelope in the mail.

Mail Using Your Own Envelope



- Complete the “Oath of Voter.” The ballot cannot be counted without the Oath of Voter. If you are unable to sign, you may use your “mark” and have a witness sign.
- Place the completed Oath of Voter and marked ballot into the envelope.
- Sign and seal the envelope.
- Add postage.
- Mail to 950 Maidu Avenue, Suite 210, Nevada City, CA 95959.

Return by Fax



- Complete the “Oath of Voter.” If you fax your ballot without the Oath of Voter, then the ballot cannot be counted. If you are unable to sign, you may use your “mark” and have a witness sign.

- Fax the Oath of Voter, marked ballot, and Transmission Cover Sheet to 530-265-9829, all within a single transmission.

How to Use the Federal Voting Assistance Program’s Email Service

Please note that the State of California does not permit voters to email voted ballots directly to the local elections official.

Uniformed and Overseas voters may, however, email their voted ballots to the Federal Voting Assistance Program (FVAP), an office within the U.S. Department of Defense. FVAP can securely fax your ballot to our office on your behalf.

- Complete the “Oath of Voter.” If you email your ballot without the Oath of Voter, then the ballot cannot be counted. If you are unable to sign, you may use your “mark” and have a witness sign.
